Dear Congregation,

Are we able to perceive "the most important things"? What are they?

In his book *The Little Prince*, Antoine de Saint-Exupery shows us how grownups are unable to perceive these "most important things". On each of six planets that the Little Prince visits, he meets an adult with a particular way of doing things and looking at them. For example, on one planet there is a king, who spends his time giving orders to be followed: he commands the sun to set at sunset. On another planet there is a geographer who has never been anywhere but who knows everything there is to know about the world. On yet another planet there lives a business man who counts the stars and lays claim to them, not seeing their beauty, because he is only interested in business. Each of these adults lives on his own planet, entirely absorbed in his own world, and lacking anyone to give him reflection. The Little Prince goes from one planet to another, looking at what these personalities are doing and trying to understand them and to meet them where they are.

But the Little Prince's encounters don't end there. He soon meets a wise fox who imparts a valuable lesson: The most important things, "can only be seen with the heart, not the eyes." Through their unique bond, the Little Prince discovers the true nature of love and care. This revelation prompts him to recognize the importance of relationships—with others, with nature, and within ourselves. It is through these connections that we grow, learn, and become more fully human. He comes to understand that it was his love for a rose on his home planet that made the rose special to him, and this relationship brings in turn a responsibility.

The realisation of what love means comes about through the Prince's encounters with others. When we open ourselves to different perspectives and acknowledge the unique gifts and talents of those around us, we embark on a path of personal growth and discovery. This inward journey transforms us, allowing us to appreciate the beauty in both the outer and inner worlds. It

empowers us to become active participants in co-creating a better world—one filled with compassion, kindness, and harmony. It also brings a responsibility: the responsibility to care for and maintain our relationships.

All of this bears on the theme of our Michaelmas conference, Artificial Intelligence and the Quest for the Truly Human. We are delighted that Jeremy Naydler will join us for the Michaelmas weekend, where we will turn to the theme of intelligence. Jeremy is the author of In the Shadow of the Machine: The Prehistory of the Computer and the Evolution of Consciousness, The Struggle for a Human Future: 5G, Augmented Reality and the Internet of Things, amongst many other books. In the Middle Ages the angels were called intelligences, because human beings knew that we had something in common with the guiding powers of the world. Now the headlines are full of Artificial Intelligence, but how does this relate to spiritual intelligence, which has long been understood as definitive of human nature?

We are glad to announce a new weekly Gospel Study group on **Christ Landscapes**, which will be lead by Selina Horn. This will run for eight weeks on Friday afternoon at 3pm, staring on 6th October.

The British Priests' Synod will be held in Forest Row from Monday, 23rd - Thursday, 26th October. We would be grateful for any offers of accommodation for our colleagues!
